

#### The Great Outdoors

We are now at the time of year when in the past model railway magazines used to feature outdoor garden railways be they steam, clockwork or electric. When we moved to Bletchley Park six years ago few of us, would ever have considered that we would have such a facility ourselves. There was some initial scepticism about whether such a facility would ever be used and by whom. Needless to say those doubts are no longer part of any discussion and we are now into year four of the building programme.

On those hot summer afternoons, visitors to the park can enjoy watching the trains running round be they gauge O, gauge 1, 16mm/SM32 or G scale. They will soon be joined by further circuits in OO, EM and even N.

We have in the past few weeks suffered some minor vandalism to the facility which has resulted in the securing of the former greenhouse into a control centre (which nowadays in modern parlance is a SDC or Service Delivery Centre). This will enable us to secure the controllers and power supplies etc.

We will now need to be vigilant and we have reported the damage (irritating rather than fatal) to the park. Could anyone using the outdoor tracks please ensure that they check pointwork (the screws were removed last time and this could have resulted in an expensive train hitting the concrete floor.

Once the control has been set up, any faults will be recorded in the fault book and this will enable our outdoor team of Geoff Bell, Steve Dennison and Geoff Mathie to take appropriate action. With a layout as big as this and with the effects of sun, rain, snow and other niceties to contend with, then faults will occur from time to time. As the squirrel population get excited when they see the trains, they tend to over react and clearing up the results from the tracks is just one of the added delights of running outdoor railways.

## The Class 45 'Peaks'

First introduced in 1960, the Class 45 locomotives were a development of the original ten locomotives (later Class 44) that were introduced a year earlier. The first ten were all named after mountain peaks, the name being generically applied to all Class 44, 45 and 46 locomotives by rail enthusiasts.

The first batch (originally numbered D11-D49) was built at Derby in 1960/1. The second group (originally numbered D50-D137) was constructed at Crewe between 1960 and 1963. After the adoption of the TOPS numbering system in 1971, locomotives originally numbered in the series D50 – D137 became Class 45. Those with steam heat boilers were designated Class 45/0 (carrying numbers 45001-45077) and those with electric train heating became Class 45/1 (carrying numbers 45101-50).

The Peaks replaced steam traction on principal trains to and from London St. Pancras during the early 1960s, working trains over the Midland Main Line, on the Settle – Carlisle route and also on the Waverley route between Carlisle, Hawick, Galashiels and Edinburgh. The latter line taking its name from the Waverley novels of Sir Walter Scott who lived near Melrose on this line. At one time St. Pancras had both day and overnight trains to both Glasgow and Edinburgh and the Peaks regularly worked the St.Pancras – Edinburgh sleeper train which travelled over both the Settle & Carlisle and the Waverley route, until the latter line closed in January 1969.

In the early 1980s, the Peaks were displaced from front line passenger work on the Midland Main Line following the arrival of the High Speed Trains (HST's). This led to the Class being utilised on other workings including parcels and freight trains. Some were transferred onto cross-country routes such as Newcastle – Plymouth.

By 1988 only one locomotive remained in traffic (No. 45106) which had been repainted in green livery specifically for hauling enthusiast trains. A major defect resulted in the rapid withdrawal of the locomotive and the end

## DETONATORS

The fifth in a new series of articles by Dave Meaden

Detonators are used to warn Drivers: "if you run over one or more detonators bring your train under control and be prepared to stop at an obstruction". These were used if the route was impeded in any way or as a warning.

Detonators were placed on the running rail and exploded when the locomotive or train wheels passed over it.

The detonator is a round disc made of metal, soldered onto it are strips of lead, approx. 4" long (100 cms) and .25" of an inch wide (10 cms). These were used to fit the detonator to the rail and keep it firm. Detonators are approx. 2.5" (63 cms) wide and .75" of an inch deep (23 cms). Inside are two discs like washers, one has holes in it, and the other has studs. Surrounding the discs and keeping them apart is gunpowder. It is airtight and when compressed the two discs are pushed together, thus causing an explosion.

Detonators are highly dangerous and should only be used by experienced railway staff.

The detonators are painted different colours and are dated by month and year, having a shelf life of just five years. These were changed on locomotives every three years.

On locomotives and multiple units they are kept in a sealed container, which must be checked daily to see that the seals had not been broken. There are ten in each container and if they are used for protecting the train etc. they have to be replenished at the next signal box or station en-route. The box now unsealed, must be replaced by a sealed box at the earliest opportunity.
