

In the begining - Part 21

At the AGM held on 28 January 1986 it was recorded that member, Phil Bennett, a well known local dentist and keen Trix Twin collector had passed away. The Chairman, Les Wood reported that the club had exhibited at 12 venues during 1985. Thanks had been received from the Gauge O Guild for assisting with their Annual Convention.

During the AGM, Treasurer Gordon Etherington reported that membership stood at 53. Chris Hughes outlined developments on the Verney Junction layout following its 2 year rest. It was being adapted at that time to allow end to end running in the club room rather than the continous mode, which filled up much of the available space. John Symons outlined work that had been carried out on Alverton to make its exhibition venue at our show. Some shortcomings had been identified and were to be resolved before the next outing. It was reported that a new OO modern image layout was being planned based on the Gainsborough area. The project team however lost interest and the project never left the drawing board.

The election of Officers resulted in CMRA Rep. Chris Hughes becoming Secretary, with Colin Catley covering CMRA Rep's responsibilities. The previous secretary Dennis Lovett, stood down to concentrate on B.R.'s Cannon Street Exhibition. The committee consisted of Fred Collins, Austin Daly, Geoff Bell and Colin Catley.

Following the AGM the competition results were announced by judges, Peter Simmerson and Rodney Hall. They were;

Three of the prizes were not awarded and Peter

Simmerson commented on the smaller number of entries and a general lowering of standards.

Honourary Member, Ivor Evans, a leading authority on Welsh private owner coal wagons suffered a stroke but it was recorded that he was making a spirited recovery.

During February, the club enjoyed an illustrated talk on I.K. Brunel on the 11th February and the club dinner on 22 February at the Cosgrove Lodge Hotel. The price of the meal was recorded as £8 each! A bring & buy evening was held on 25th February and proves a little disappointing. Only 37 of the 148 available lots changed hands!

Two cub groups attended the club room on 13th and 20th March. As well as tour of the facilities, the cubs had the hobby expalied to them. The club minutes record that they asked some very sensible questions for boys of their age.

At the March 1986 committee meeting the committee were trying to get to grips with the effects of the Data Protection Act. 34 members were recorded as having paid up and having their data recorded! The Treasurer reported that this was an increase in 9 over the same time the previous year.

Twelve members attended the CMRA Convention at Hatfield on 12 April which was once again a great success.

By the June 1986 meeting membership stood at 45. It was reported that the turntable for Alverton was under construction.

The club outing took place on 6 July to the Midland Railway Centre at Buttlerley and the Tramway Museum at Crich.

Triang TT

TT or Table Top Railways first arrived in this country in 1951 when the Rokal range was imported. The range at 3mm to the foot sits comfortably between N scale (OOO as it was first known was still 9 years away) and OO.

In 1953 Walter Lines, Chairman of Lines Brothers, the makers of Triang Railways, saw a TT set produced in Switzerland by Wesa. On his return he told Triang to develop a similar system which they began once they had moved to Margate in 1954. The Triang TT system was launched in 1957.

The first locomotives to emerge were an ex LMS Jinty and a WR Castle Class 4-6-0. Whilst the Jinty can be identified as smaller version of its bigger brother, Triang never did produce a OO Castle, the Castle in the range being the Hornby - Dublo version which it later re-released under its Wrenn label. A small range of wagons and Mk 1 coaches also appeared and a sets and accessories were offered from the begining.

In 1959 a Merchant Navy 4-6-2 and a Class 31 A1A-A1A diesel appeared, with the Brittania appearing a year later, when the same manufacturer introduced its OO version. A WR 61xx 2-6-2T and a DMU followed in 1961.

For a brief period manufacturing began at the company's Calais factory. A French locomotive (0-6-0T) which fitted on the Jinty chassis soon followed but after 6 months production was switched back to Margate.

The TT range was not developed as fully as it might have been. The emergence of OOO or N effectively killing off the scale.


The last catalogue appeared in 1964. By this time TT sales were poor although existing stock remained available, new products were not forthcoming. In 1966 there was a shortage of coaches, so a run of 1,200 MK 1 coaches in blue and grey livery was produced.

In 1968 existing stock was passed to the Wrenn subsidary and sold for a time as the Wrenn Table Top Railway,

The end of production virtually killed off the scale. A strong society was formed (3mm Society) to keep the flag flying, which it has succesfully done.

The opening up of Eastern Europe has resulted in an influx of continental items in their favoured scale - TT. Perhaps Mr Dapol will reenter the market in due course!
